
One quote stands out; a powerful and timely message: "When we were going into battle, there were no Republicans or Democrats...we were all one, fighting for a common cause."


Maurice "Hank" R. Greenberg - D-Day First Wave Omaha Beach Veteran

On *June 2*, renowned Berlin-based artists Renata Stih and Frieder Schnock came to inaugurate the newly restored Conservatory building with an art show they crafted specifically for D-Day 80: *ROSIE WON THE WAR* (portraits of modern day "Rosies"), and *THE HOLLYWOOD CANTEEN* (portraits of Hollywood female stars who contributed to the war effort).






They also installed a large version of a letter written by a "Rosie" to her husband on the frontlines to explain how working for the war effort had changed her.

Later that day, our filmmaker friend, Steve Nemsick, came to record an interview by Ms. Susan Eisenhower of COL (Ret.) Keith Nightingale about the history of his legendary Staff Rides in Normandy.

This interview will form part of the Staff Rides Film Series that The Normandy Institute is producing, archiving COL Nightingale's knowledge and stories as recounted to him by the original soldiers of D-Day. There will be 13 episodes, each introduced by a serving or retired General.





On *June 3*, we were pleased to host 100 guests for the first of what will become an annual dinner honoring the 1st Division—the Big Red One. GEN Meyer and COL Nightingale gave passionate speeches about the role of the Division at Omaha Beach on D-Day and beyond.

Sadly, our guest of honor, D-Day First Wave Medic Charles Norman Shay, could not attend as he was under the weather. However, he was with us in spirit and has since celebrated his 100th birthday.

Led by GEN Meyer, a large group of senior officers of the 1st Division gathered on the steps of Château de Bernaville. Ms. Susan Eisenhower and her daughter, Caroline de Carvalho-Eisenhower, joined us for this historic event.

We had a wonderful surprise for our guests with a performance by singer/songwriter Scotty Hasting (a 1st Division Afghanistan veteran) of his song *Red*, *White & Blue*.

This dinner was generously supported by The Robert R. McCormick Foundation with its CEO, Timothy Knight, in attendance. We encourage everyone to put the 1st Division Museum at Cantigny near Chicago on your to-do list.









On *June 4*, we hosted our fourth annual Generals and Admirals Dinner with our Guest of Honor GEN Christopher Cavoli, Commander U.S. European Command and Supreme Allied Commander, Europe. We were also honored to host the Secretary of the Army, the Honorable Christine Wormuth. She was joined by the following Generals: Saltzman, George, Hokanson, Langley, Poppas, Kurilla, Hecker, Fenton, Chris Donahue, Braga, Basham, Izaguirre, Work, Meyer, Palm, Sylvia, DiNonno, Ferguson, Del Rosso, Wasmund, Rose Keravuori, Eero Keravuaori, and Couëtoux, as well as Admiral Munsch and Vice Admiral Bradley. Joining them were many retired officers, including GEN Mark Milley, recently retired Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and Generals Nicholson, Rodriguez, Votel, Perkins, Kellogg, Zais, Collet, Patrick Donahue, Lund, Ashley, Freakley, and Huntoon, all devotees of the Normandy Commemoration.

The dinner was exceptional for several reasons. Many of the attendees comment each year how rare it is to have the opportunity to socialize in a confidential setting, off-the-record, and against such an important historical backdrop.

More importantly, we were extremely honored to host for this dinner 18 WWII veterans, among them 10 D-Day veterans, two Korea veterans, eight Vietnam veterans and an Afghanistan veteran, as well as five Medal of Honor recipients. The veterans were brought to Normandy by The Greatest Generations Foundation and American Airlines, for which we are eternally grateful.

During the cocktail hour the officers were eager to talk with all the veterans and to have a photo taken on the steps of Château de Bernaville. GEN Cavoli gave a rousing speech about the importance of alliances, a key theme of the mission of The Normandy Institute.

The dinner began with a performance by world-renowned cellist Michael Fitzpatrick, who played *Song of the Birds* as a musical benediction. He closed the dinner with an exceptional cello version of *Taps*. You could hear a pin drop and there were tears in many eyes. Scores of friends from all over the world had made the effort to join us for this dinner that will be forever etched in our memory.





























































On *June 5*, the Annual Allied Ceremony took place in Bayeux at the General Eisenhower Statue. The ceremony was conducted by GEN Cavoli and Ms. Susan Eisenhower who, in 2019, had initiated this annual event with The Normandy Institute and the Mayor's office in Bayeux.

We were honored to have present the Honorable Christine Wormuth, the 25th Secretary of the Army, joined by Generals Milley, Hokanson, and Admiral Stuart Munsch, Commander of U.S. Naval Forces Europe and Africa and Allied Joint Forces. Also participating were GEN Chance Saltzman, Commander of Space Force Operations, GEN Michael Langley, Commander of AFRICOM, GEN James Hecker, Commander of U.S. Air Forces in Europe, Air Forces Africa and Allied Air Command, LTG Mary Izaguirre, Surgeon General of the U.S. Army, LTG Steven Basham, Deputy Commander, U.S. European Command, and LTG (Ret.) David Huntoon.


The turnout was extraordinary and the Mayor's office of Bayeux organized a large contingent of French troops to participate in the ceremony. We had requested a fly-over which happened at 9:30am sharp. There was also a bugler present who played *Taps*.

GEN Cavoli, Ms. Eisenhower and the Deputy Mayor of Bayeux all gave speeches. It is clear that the Allied Ceremony will be a recurring event in the D-Day Commorations going forward. The spirit of the alliance of nations who fought the Battle of Normandy, and WWII in general, is a moral compass for future alliances.





















After The Allied Ceremony in Bayeux, we rushed back to Château de Bernaville to host the WWII veterans supported by American Airlines, along with the WWII veterans who were guests of United Airlines, a beautiful sign of friendship and alliance between these two patriotic corporations. We are so grateful for their efforts and ongoing support of veterans.

There were over 400 guests for this luncheon! Ist Division veteran Scotty Hasting performed his song *Red*, *White & Blue*, and American Airlines COO, David Seymour, and Randy Stillinger, Manager of Military and Veterans initiatives, presented us with beautiful commemorative plaques.

Words can't describe the emotion that everyone felt to be so close to these brave men and women of The Greatest Generation and how much fun they are to be around. The banter, joking and general laughter was just fantastic.

Again, the historic photo took some time to organize, but all were good sports and patiently waited to be placed. It was a very emotional and uplifting moment. We want to thank American Airlines for supporting this exceptional and unforgettable event.

Friends from all over the world had once more joined us for this personal salute to The Greatest Generation. We all felt that this might be the last pilgrimage for some of the Veterans, though many said they hope to return.

The historic divisions of the Battle of Normandy and beyond are deeply attached to their legacy. On *June 8*, Patton Legacy Sports and its Chairman, Michelle Strauss, hosted the Remembrance Bowl BBQ at Château de Bernaville.

The Remembrance Bowl is the annual flag football game between the 82nd and 101st Airborne Division soldiers. It was very well attended and great fun. The Remembrance Bowl has become a annual event in the D-Day Commemoration calendar.

The 18th Airborne Corps Commander (this year GEN Donahue) plays one half of the game with the 82nd team and the other half with the 101st team.

We served Normandy grilled sausages on French bread, to the great delight of the soldiers who had participated in the game that morning. GEN Donahue joined us too.

On *June 9*, we attended one of the most perfect commemorative parachute drops in recent history.

Each year, at La Fière Bridge, U.S. and Allied paratroopers perform a commemorative jump on the Sunday closest to June 6.

This was the grand finale of the D-Day 80 Commemorative week of ceremonies. It is a unique event that you must experience in person, standing in the cowpad, rubbing shoulders with WWII veterans, Generals, paratroopers, and members of the U.S. Congress in the most informal and convivial atmosphere. We hope this event will be maintained forever more.

We were joined on the drop zone by twenty U.S. Senators who were part of the congressional delegation to Normandy. We were honored to interact with Senators Cruz, Manchin, Blumenthal, Cassidy, Peters, Boozman, Hassan, Shaheen, Reed, and Murray. Many of the Senators participated in our 2021 film, *Members of Congress Pay Tribute to The Greatest Generation*, with personal stories about family members and WWII.


















The Normandy Institute wishes to express its deep gratitude to all its donors and supporters for their generosity. Every donation counts and creates an ever wider community around our mission.
